

## DISABLED WINTERSPORT AUSTRALIA PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT POLICY

<b>POLICY NAME</b>	Personal Protective Equipment Policy
<b>DATE OF ISSUE</b>	12 June 2019
<b>POLICY COVERAGE</b>	This policy applies to all Disabled Wintersport Australia (DWA) members, volunteers and staff participating in skiing or snowboarding activities on a DWA program or service.
<b>DATE OF REVIEW</b>	This policy will be reviewed at least annually and more often should legislative requirements other material changes to circumstances require.

### 1. SCOPE

- 1.1. This policy applies to all DWA members, volunteers and staff skiing or snowboarding on a DWA program or service.

### 2. PURPOSE

- 2.1. To ensure DWA members, volunteers and staff are protected from environmental elements.
- 2.2. To promote safety and responsibility to DWA members, stakeholders and the general public.

### 3. DEFINITIONS

- 3.1. **DWA personnel** refers to all staff and volunteers

### 4. PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

- 4.1. When participating in ski and snowboard activities on snow, all DWA personnel and participants should be wearing, at a minimum:
  - 4.1.1. Waterproof jacket.
    - 4.1.1.1. Where conditions allow (e.g. warm weather), the jacket may be removed but the arms must still be covered by other clothing.
  - 4.1.2. Ski or snowboard helmet (it is **compulsory** to wear a helmet)
  - 4.1.3. Goggles or sunglasses.
  - 4.1.4. Gloves.
  - 4.1.5. Waterproof pants.

4.1.6. Ski or snowboard boots or closed toe shoes.

4.1.7. Sunscreen.

4.1.8. Clothing layers appropriate to the conditions.

## **5. ADAPTIVE SNOWSPORT GUIDE UNIFORM**

5.1. As well as the above personal protective equipment, the DWA adaptive snowsport guide uniform consists of:

5.1.1. DWA branded jacket – where possible;

5.1.1.1. When guiding on snow wherever practically possible guides will be provided with a DWA branded jacket.

5.2. Apart from the DWA branded jacket, all other uniform items must be provided by the volunteer or staff member.
